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HMP LEICESTER – GOOD PROGRESS

There had been significant improvements in a number of areas at HMP Leicester, said Nick Hardwick, Chief Inspector of Prisons, publishing the report of an unannounced inspection of the local city-centre prison.

HMP Leicester is small and crowded with a transient and needy population. A previous inspection found the prison was beginning to rise to these challenges but there was more to do.

Inspectors were pleased to find that:

- Leicester remained reasonably safe, with adequate suicide and self-harm arrangements and proportionate security;
- clinical support to substance users was good;
- staff-prisoner relationships were generally positive and the personal officer scheme was improving;
- time out of cell had improved, accompanied by an increase in purposeful activity, and improved education provision; and
- there had a been a sound focus on resettlement, with good strategic planning and management and a number of useful reintegration services available.

Inspectors also noted, however, that:

- the Victorian prison environment remained worn and cramped, despite efforts to maintain standards;
- although few prisoners were unemployed, the range and quality of activities was limited; and
- healthcare was undergoing a period of changes, and was the subject of complaints from prisoners.

Nick Hardwick said:

“Leicester is a small, complex local prison which has to address the many risks and needs posed by its transient population in an ageing and inadequate environment. Commendably, this report identifies a good deal of progress against our previous recommendations and, therefore, some success in overcoming a number of these challenges. As a result, Leicester is now performing reasonably well against all our tests of a healthy prison.”

Michael Spurr, Chief Executive Officer of the National Offender Management Service (NOMS), said:

"I am pleased that the Chief Inspector records the progress made at Leicester despite the difficulties the prison faces in terms of the ageing physical infrastructure.

“The Governor and staff are maintaining a safe and decent environment with a strong focus on resettlement. Positive relationships with staff and effective resettlement all reduce the likelihood of re-offending and help to protect the public.”
