



Criminal Justice Statistics Quarterly Update to December 2011 Ministry of Justice Statistics bulletin

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Introduction

This report presents the key statistics on activity in the Criminal Justice System (CJS) for England and Wales. It provides information for the latest twelve months (January 2011 to December 2011) with accompanying commentary, analysis and presentation of longer term trends.

The information in this publication for 2011 in relation to court proceedings and outcomes is provisional. The total numbers of convictions and associated sentences for principal offences at the Crown Court in 2011 reported in this statistical release differ from the totals reported in the Sentencing Council's publication 'Crown Court Sentencing Survey, 2011'. The latter presents statistics from an ongoing data collection exercise of sentencing decisions made in the Crown Court. Further details are provided on page 50.

Alongside the publication is a technical document titled "A Guide to Criminal Justice Statistics". This document provides users with detailed information on the concepts and methods used in compiling this bulletin, including the quality of the data, along with guidance on statistical revisions and forthcoming changes. Where appropriate, comparisons are made between different sources covering activity in the CJS. In particular, comparisons are made to numbers of crimes recorded by the police (often the starting point for crimes dealt with by other CJS agencies) rather than estimates from the Crime Survey for England and Wales (known until 1 April 2012 as the British Crime Survey). The Crime Survey for England and Wales provides robust estimates of trends in crimes against the population resident in households, including those never reported to the police, but excludes other crimes such as those against businesses or so-called 'victimless' crime. Therefore police recorded crime provides a more meaningful comparison for measures relating to the wider CJS. Findings from the Crime Survey for England and Wales and recorded crime data are published together in statistical bulletins by the Office for National Statistics.

The data provides users with information about proven offending and its outcomes in England and Wales. The contents of this bulletin will be of interest to government policy makers in the development of policy and their subsequent monitoring and evaluation. Others will be interested in the way different crimes are dealt with in the Criminal Justice System.

Information about the symbols and conventions used in the bulletin are given in the explanatory notes section.

Main findings

Overview of the Criminal Justice System in 2011

In the calendar year 2011, there were 2.00 million individuals² given an out of court disposal or proceeded against at court. This compares with 2.12 million individuals in the calendar year 2010, a decline of 5.7 per cent. This included a 5.7 per cent fall in the use of out of court disposals (from 466,000 to 439,400) – continuing the fall in use of out of court disposals since 2007.

There was also a 5.7 per cent fall in the number of defendants proceeded against at court (from 1,653,200 to 1,559,000). This continues the decrease observed since 2004, which has been driven by falls in prosecutions for summary offences, which have fallen by 27.0 per cent since 2004. Prosecutions for indictable offences have fallen by 8.7 per cent since 2004 and are higher now than in 2007 and 2008.

Since 2004, convictions for summary offences have fallen largely in line with trends in prosecutions. Convictions for indictable offences have not followed this pattern however, and since 2001 have fluctuated between 303,000 and 351,000, giving a broadly flat trend in convictions for indictable offences over the last decade.

Out of Court Disposals

Since 2007, the use of out of court disposals has decreased by 34.4 per cent (from 669,900 to 439,400 in 2011). The decline in the use of out of court disposals coincided with the replacement in April 2008 of a target to increase offences brought to justice, with one placing more emphasis on bringing serious crime to justice. The latter target was subsequently removed in May 2010.

There is evidence, however, that the rate of decline in the use of out of court disposals is slowing. The 5.7 per cent decline between 2010 and 2011 compares to an average annual fall of 10.0 per cent between 2007 and 2010.

Police cautions

There were 232,200 cautions administered in 2011 (including juveniles given a reprimand or final warning), representing a 4.4 per cent decrease compared with 2010 (242,800). This continues the downward trend in the use of cautions observed since a peak in 2007, with the 2011 figure representing a 36.0 per cent decrease compared with the 2007 total (362,900).

The decrease in cautions between 2010 and 2011 was largely driven by declining cautions administered for indictable offences. In particularly, the largest relative decrease was observed for the indictable offence *violence against the person*, which fell by 26.4 per cent (from 21,900 to 16,100).

Four in every five cautions issued for indictable offences are for *violence against the person*, *theft and handling* or *drug offences*.

Penalty Notices for Disorder (PNDs) and cannabis warnings

There were 127,500 PNDs issued in 2011, a decrease of 9.4 per cent compared with 2010 (140,800). Similar to cautions, this continues the downward trend in issues of PNDs observed since a peak in 2007, with the 2011 figure representing a 38.6 per cent decrease compared with the 2007 total (207,500).

This decrease between 2010 and 2011 has been observed in all offence groups except for *possession of cannabis*, for which the issuing of PNDs has increased year-on-year since coming into effect in 2009.

PNDs issued for *possession of cannabis* increased by 2,400 (from 13,900 to 16,300, a 17.0 per cent rise) between 2010 and 2011. However, cannabis warnings decreased by 2,700 (from 82,400 to 79,700, a 3.3 per decline) over the same period. This suggests that the use of out of court disposals for those in possession of cannabis has remained constant but with an increased usage of PNDs rather than cannabis warnings.




Figure 1.2: Out of court disposals, 2001 to 2011

Court proceedings and sentencing


In 2011, there were 1.56 million defendants proceeded against in magistrates' courts and 1.30 million offenders convicted and sentenced of a criminal offence at all courts.

Prosecutions and convictions peaked in 2004 and have both since fallen, by 22.9 per cent and 16.0 per cent respectively. These falls have largely been driven by declines in proceedings for summary non motoring and summary motoring offences.

For the more serious indictable offences, prosecutions have fallen by 8.7 per cent since 2004. The number of convictions for indictable offences have remained broadly flat over the same period, resulting in a rise in the conviction ratio from 70.1 per cent in 2004 to 81.8 per in 2011 – the highest ratio in 11 years.

Looking over the past year, the 1.56 million proceedings in 2011 compares with 1.65 million in 2010, a decrease of 5.7 per cent. There were 4.9 per cent fewer offenders convicted and sentenced, the 1.30 million in 2011 comparing with 1.37 million in 2010.

In 2011, there were:

- 414,000 prosecutions and 338,600 convictions for indictable offences a decrease of 5.5 and 3.4 per cent respectively since 2010. Looking over the decade, prosecutions for indictable offences peaked at 517,100 in 2002 and have fallen by 19.9 per cent since, while convictions have fluctuated over the entire decade between 303,000 and 351,000.
- 598,400 prosecutions and 488,400 convictions for summary non-motoring offences – a decrease of 1.4 per cent and 1.0 per cent respectively since 2010, continuing the decrease in both prosecutions and convictions since 2004.
- 546,600 prosecutions and 473,400 convictions for summary motoring offences – a decrease of 10.1 per cent and 9.6 per cent respectively since 2010 and a continuation of the large falls in both prosecutions and convictions for summary motoring offences since 2004.

The public disorder of August 2011 is included in these figures. Those convicted for the public disorder by the end of December 2011 account for less than one per cent of all people convicted in 2011.

Figure 1.4a: Percentage change in convictions by offence type and offence group, 2010 to 2011





Figure 1.4b: Percentage change in convictions by offence type and offence group, 2001 to 2011



Immediate custody

In 2011, there were 102,700 persons sentenced to immediate custody, an increase of 1.2 per cent from 101,500 persons in 2010 but 8.0 per cent lower than the peak of 111,600 persons sentenced in 2002. The immediate custody rate declined from 7.9 per cent in 2002 to a low of 6.7 per cent in 2007 and has increased back to the 2002 level of 7.9 per cent in 2011.

In 2011, there were:

- 85,200 people sentenced to immediate custody for indictable offences, an increase of 2.8 per cent compared to 2010 and the highest since 2002.
- 14,300 people sentenced to immediate custody for summary non-motoring offences, a decrease of 2.6 per cent compared to 2010. This continues the decline from the peak of 14,700 in 2009, which was the turning point after a steady rise since 2002.
- 3,200 people sentenced to immediate custody for summary motoring offences, a fall of 18.8 per cent since 2010 and continuing year on year falls since 2003 when there were 17,400 immediate custodial sentences for these offences.
- There were 1,214 indeterminate sentences (either a life sentence or an Indeterminate sentence for Public Protection an IPP) handed down in 2011, a 13.5 per cent decrease from 1,403 in 2010. This continued the fall since the Criminal Justice and Immigration Act (CJIA) 2008 was introduced, which restricted the use of IPPs. Within this group, the number of life sentences increased from 384 during 2010 to 395 during 2011, the first annual increase since 2008.

In 2011, the Average Custodial Sentence Length (ACSL) was 14.7 months, an increase of 1.0 month compared to 2010, and up from 11.8 months in 2001. The rise in ACSL has been driven by the change in the case mix of people getting custodial sentences and longer sentences for indictable offences.

- In 2001, summary motoring offences accounted for 15.9 per cent of immediate custodial sentences, with an ACSL of 3.4 months. By 2011, they accounted for just 3.1 per cent of immediate custodial sentences, with a reduction in ACSL to 3.1 months.
- In 2001, indictable offences accounted for 75.5 per cent of immediate custodial sentences, with an ACSL of 14.7 months. By 2011 they accounted for 83.0 per cent of immediate custodial sentences, with an increase in ACSL to 17.2 months. In particular, sexual offences saw a rise in ACSL from 40.0 months in 2004 to 53.2 months in 2011, following the implementation of the Sexual Offences Act 2003
- The decrease in indeterminate sentences mentioned above coincides with an increase in long determinate sentences (10 years or more) from 514 in 2010 to 671 in 2011, a 30.5 per cent increase, and the highest number in the last 11 years. This may also have contributed to the increase in average custodial sentence length since 2008.

Figure 1.5: Offenders receiving an indeterminate custodial sentence and average custodial sentence length for all offenders; 2001 to 2011



Fines

Fines are the most common sentence passed at court, accounting for around two-thirds of all sentences handed out by the criminal courts (65.5 per cent in 2011). The fine rate is consistent with that seen in 2010, and has declined from a peak of 70.0 per cent in 2004. The decline has been due to a decline in prosecutions and subsequent conviction for summary motoring offences – the offence type for which fines are most commonly given.

The 2011 figure of 851,600 fines represents a decrease of 4.7 per cent compared to 2010, and the lowest number of fines handed out over the last 11 years.

Suspended Sentences and Community Orders

In 2011, 173,400 people (or 13.3 per cent of those sentenced) were given a Community Sentence, an 8.4 per cent decrease compared with 2010.

In 2011, 47,800 people (or 3.7 per cent of those sentenced) were given a Suspended Sentence Order, a 0.7 per cent decrease compared with 2010.




Figure 1.6: Flows through the Criminal Justice System, 2011

Offending Histories

This section provides information on the breakdown of offences committed by new and repeat offenders, the trends in new entrants to the criminal justice system, and breakdowns of the criminal histories of cautioned and sentenced offenders.

24.8 per cent of offences in 2011 were committed by offenders with no previous criminal offences, a decrease by almost 10 percentage points since 2006. There were 208,300 first time entrants to the criminal justice system in 2011, continuing the year on year decline observed since 2006 – the 2011 figure representing a 36.8 per cent decrease compared to 2006 levels. This is driven by the decline since 2006 in the use of cautions³ in dealing with first time entrants.




Figure 1.7: First offences and further offences in 2011

The number of juvenile first time entrants to the criminal justice system has fallen much more sharply than for adult offenders in recent years – down 64.7 per cent in 2011 from 2006 levels compared with a 23.0 per cent decrease for adults since 2006.

The differing trends in adult and juvenile first time entrants are largely due to the different disposals received. The majority of juvenile first time entrants received a reprimand or final warning – 80.9 per cent in 2011 – while roughly half of adult first time entrants receive a caution – 51.2 per cent in 2011.

10.1 per cent of offenders convicted of indictable offences in 2011 had no previous criminal offences. 31.2 per cent had 15 or more previous offences, a proportion which has grown year on year over the last decade – the 2011 proportion representing an increase of 13.3 percentage points since 2001.

Offences

This section differs from the previous section in that it considers the total number of notifiable offences.

Much of the activity in the Criminal Justice System starts with the police, when a crime is reported, investigated and detected. The Home Office report on the police activity and the crimes they deal with. In 2011, recorded crime decreased by 2.8 per cent, from 4.16 million in 2010 down to 4.04 million offences.

Over the same period, for the equivalent notifiable offences, the use of out of court disposals decreased by 4.9 per cent. Specifically, Penalty Notices for Disorder (PNDs) were down 12.1 per cent, cautions decreased 2.8 per cent and cannabis warnings reduced by 3.3 per cent. Convictions for notifiable offences also decreased, by 4.3 per cent.

Offence Group Summary

Violence against the person:

- The number of cautions administered in 2011 was 16,100, a decrease of 26.4 per cent from 21,900 in 2010. Cautions for the offence increased from 19,600 in 2001 to a peak of 57,300 in 2006, and have fallen each year since.
- The total number proceeded against at magistrates' courts in 2011 was 59,500, a decrease of 10.7 per cent from 66,600 in 2010, and the lowest number over the last decade. Proceedings for the offence decreased from a peak of 79,600 in 2003 to 59,900 in 2008, followed by two consecutive years of increase before the drop in 2011.
- There were 42,200 convictions at all courts in 2011, a decrease of 5.8 per cent from 44,800 in 2010. Convictions for the offence increased from a low over the decade of 35,300 in 2001 to 42,000 in 2007, and have fluctuated since.
- The average custodial sentence length (ACSL) in 2011 was 18.8 months, an increase of 5.3 per cent from 17.8 months in 2010. ACSL for the offence has increased year on year since 2006 when it stood at 16.8 months.

Sexual Offences:

- The number of cautions administered in 2011 was 1,500, an increase of 12.3 per cent from 1,400 in 2010, and a reversal of a decreasing trend in recent years. Cautions for the offence increased from 1,200 in 2001 to a peak of 1,900 in 2007, before falling each year to 2010.
- The total number proceeded against at magistrates' courts in 2011 was 9,900, a decrease of 6.1 per cent from 10,600 in 2010. Proceedings for the offence fluctuated between 2001 and 2008, before rising to a peak over the last decade in 2010. The 2011 figure represents an 18.1 per cent increase since 2001.
- There were 6,000 convictions at all courts in 2011, an increase of 3.3 per cent from 5,800 in 2010, continuing the trend of virtually year on year increases since the 4,000 convictions for the offence in 2001.
- The average custodial sentence length (ACSL) in 2011 was 53.2 months, an increase of 9.3 per cent from 48.7 months in 2010. ACSL for the offence has increased virtually year on year since 2001, when it stood at 37.8 months.

Burglary:

- The number of cautions administered in 2011 was 3,400, a decrease of 3.6 per cent from 3,500 in 2010. Cautions for the offence increased from 6,400 in 2001 to a peak of 7,700 in 2006, and have fallen each year since.
- The total number proceeded against at magistrates' courts in 2011 was 32,900, an increase of 3.4 per cent from 31,800 in 2010. Proceedings for the offence peaked at 43,600 in 2002 before decreasing to 30,600 in 2006. The

- There were 25,100 convictions at all courts in 2011, an increase of 5.0 per cent from 23,900 in 2010. Convictions for the offence have fluctuated over the past decade, falling as low as 23,000 in 2005 and 2006 and rising as high as 26,700 in 2002, with 2011 numbers broadly in line with 2001 levels.
- The average custodial sentence length (ACSL) in 2011 was 18.8 months, an increase of 0.3 per cent from 18.7 months in 2010. ACSL for the offence has increased year on year in recent years, from 16.7 months in 2007.

Robbery:

- The number of cautions administered in 2011 was 269, an increase of 30.0 per cent from 207 in 2010, and a reversal of a decreasing trend in recent years. Cautions for the offence increased from 548 in 2001 to a peak of 712 in 2006, before falling to 205 in 2009.
- The total number proceeded against at magistrates' courts in 2011 was 14,300, an increase of 4.0 per cent from 13,700 in 2010. Proceedings for the offence have gradually increased since a low over the last decade of 12,400 in 2004.
- There were 9,300 convictions at all courts in 2011, an increase of 9.0 per cent from 8,500 in 2010. Convictions for the offence have generally been increasing over the last decade, with the 2011 numbers representing a 35.8 per cent increase since 2001.
- The average custodial sentence length (ACSL) in 2011 was 35.6 months, an increase of 3.0 per cent from 34.5 months in 2010. ACSL for the offence decreased from a peak for the last decade of 39.3 months in 2003 to a low of 31.3 months in 2007, before increasing year on year since.

Theft and handling:

- The number of cautions administered in 2011 was 43,500, a decrease of 8.5 per cent from 47,500 in 2010. Cautions for the offence increased from 63,500 in 2001 to a peak of 72,800 in 2007, and have fallen each year since.
- The total number proceeded against at magistrates' courts in 2011 was 134,000, a decrease of 1.3 per cent from 135,700 in 2010, potentially reversing an upward trend in recent years. Proceedings for the offence decreased from 163,500 in 2001 to a low of 116,500 in 2006, before increasing year on year to 2010.
- There were 120,100 convictions at all courts in 2011, a decrease of 1.4 per cent from 121,800 in 2010, and a potential reversal of the increasing trend in recent years. Over the last decade, convictions for the offence have decreased from a peak of 127,300 in 2002 to a low of 99,000 in 2006, before increasing each year to 2010.

 The average custodial sentence length (ACSL) in 2011 was 4.4 months, an increase of 8.1 per cent from 4.1 months in 2010. ACSL for the offence has fluctuated only slightly over the past decade.

Fraud and Forgery:

- The number of cautions administered in 2011 was 5,600, a decrease of 8.6 per cent from 6,100 in 2010. Cautions for the offence increased from 5,800 in 2001 to a peak of 8,600 in 2007, and have fallen each year since.
- The total number proceeded against at magistrates' courts in 2011 was 22,300, a decrease of 14.3 per cent from 26,100 in 2010 and the lowest number over the past decade. Proceedings for the offence decreased from a peak of 30,700 in 2001 to 24,900 in 2006, and remained broadly stable until the drop observed in 2011.
- There were 19,200 convictions at all courts in 2011, a decrease of 8.8 per cent from 21,000 in 2010, and a reversal of an increasing trend in recent years. Over the last decade, convictions for the offence decreased from a peak of 21,800 in 2001 to a low of 19,700 in 2006, before broadly increasing to 2010.
- The average custodial sentence length (ACSL) in 2011 was 12.9 months, an increase of 16.9 per cent from 11.0 months in 2010. ACSL for the offence increased from a low for the past decade of 8.4 months in 2002 to 10.8 months in 2006, and was then stable until the rise in 2011.

Criminal Damage:

- The number of cautions administered in 2011 was 4,700, a decrease of 7.2 per cent from 5,100 in 2010. Cautions for the offence increased from 3,400 in 2001 to a peak of 9,000 in 2006, and have fallen each year since.
- The total number proceeded against at magistrates' courts in 2011 was 8,900, a decrease of 10.3 per cent from 10,000 in 2010. Proceedings for the offence have decreased from a peak of 18,700 in 2002, with the 2011 number the lowest observed over the past decade.
- There were 7,000 convictions at all courts in 2011, a decrease of 9.6 per cent from 7,800 in 2010, and a continuation of a decreasing trend in recent years. Convictions for the offence increased from 10,700 in 2001 to a peak of 12,700 in 2006, and have fallen year on year since.
- The average custodial sentence length (ACSL) in 2011 was 19.0 months, an increase of 5.5 per cent from 18.0 months in 2010, and of 20.0 per cent from 15.9 months in 2001.

Drug Offences:

• The number of cautions administered in 2011 was 42,700, an increase of 4.8 per cent from 40,700 in 2010. Cautions for the offence have fluctuated over the past decade, falling as low as 32,600 in 2004 and rising as high as 47,000 in 2008.

- The total number proceeded against at magistrates' courts in 2011 was 66,200, a decrease of 2.3 per cent from 67,800 in 2010. This potentially reverses an upward trend observed since 2005, when proceedings stood at 43,400, a low for the past decade.
- There were 60,600 convictions at all courts in 2011, a decrease of 2.3 per cent from 62,000 in 2010, and a potential reversal of the year on year increasing trend observed since 2005 (when convictions for the offence stood at 39,100, the lowest number over the past decade).
- The average custodial sentence length (ACSL) in 2011 was 31.0 months, an increase of 0.8 per cent from 30.7 months in 2010. ACSL for the offence has been broadly decreasing since a peak over the last decade of 37.3 months in 2004.

Other Indictable Offences (excluding motoring offences):

- The number of cautions administered in 2011 was 6,100, a decrease of 14.2 per cent from 7,200 in 2010. Cautions for the offence increased from 4,200 in 2001 to a peak of 10,000 in 2007, and have fallen each year since.
- The total number proceeded against at magistrates' courts in 2011 was 62,500, a decrease of 13.2 per cent from 72,000 in 2010, and the lowest number observed over the last decade. Proceedings for the offence decreased from a peak of 100,000 in 2003 to 63,700 in 2008, followed by two consecutive years of increase before the drop in 2011.
- There were 46,000 convictions at all courts in 2011, a decrease of 10.8 per cent from 51,600 in 2010. Convictions for the offence have fluctuated over the past decade, rising as high as 54,500 in 2004 and falling as low as 40,100 in 2008.
- The average custodial sentence length (ACSL) in 2011 was 10.5 months, an increase of 10.0 per cent from 9.6 months in 2010. ACSL for the offence has fluctuated only slightly over the past decade.

Indictable Motoring:

- The total number proceeded against at magistrates' courts in 2011 was 3,500, a decrease of 6.8 per cent from 3,800 in 2010, and the lowest number observed over the last decade. Proceedings for the offence have decreased year on year since a peak of 7,100 in 2003.
- There were 3,100 convictions at all courts in 2011, a decrease of 8.8 per cent from 3,400 in 2010, and a continuation of a decreasing trend in recent years. Convictions for the offence increased from 4,200 in 2001 to a peak of 5,500 in 2003, and have fallen year on year since.
- The average custodial sentence length (ACSL) in 2011 was 9.7 months, an increase of 0.8 per cent from 9.6 months in 2010. ACSL for the offence has been broadly increasing since a low for the last decade of 7.9 months in 2001.

Summary Non-Motoring:

- The number of cautions administered in 2011 was 108,300, a decrease of 0.9 per cent from 109,300 in 2010. Cautions for the offence increased from 85,900 in 2001 to a peak of 157,800 in 2007, and have fallen each year since.
- The total number proceeded against at magistrates' courts in 2011 was 598,400, a decrease of 1.4 per cent from 607,100 in 2010. Proceedings for the offence peaked for the decade at 665,300 in 2004 and have broadly decreased since, aside a small increase between 2008 and 2009.
- There were 488,400 convictions at all courts in 2011, a decrease of 1.0 per cent from 493,500 in 2010. Convictions for the offence have been broadly stable since 2002.
- The average custodial sentence length (ACSL) in 2011 was 2.5 months, a
 decrease of 1.0 per cent from 2.6 months in 2010. ACSL for the offence has
 decreased year on year since a peak over the last decade of 2.8 months in
 2005.

Summary Motoring:

- The total number proceeded against at magistrates' courts in 2011 was 546,600, a decrease of 10.1 per cent from 608,100 in 2010. Proceedings for the offence peaked for the decade at 904,000 in 2004 and have decreased virtually year on year since.
- There were 473,400 convictions at all courts in 2011, a decrease of 9.6 per cent from 523,400 in 2010, and a continuation of a decreasing trend in recent years. Convictions for the offence increased from 583,300 in 2001 to a peak of 707,900 in 2004, and have fallen virtually year on year since.
- The average custodial sentence length (ACSL) in 2011 was 3.1 months, the same as in 2010. ACSL for the offence has decreased since a peak over the last decade of 3.5 months in 2003.

Out of court disposals

Out of Court Disposals aim to deal with low risk, low-level and mostly first-time offenders outside of the court system in appropriate circumstances. Out of Court Disposals are not suitable for contested or more serious cases. They would not normally be considered for those who offend repeatedly (subject to relevant guidance). Out of court disposals can include cannabis warnings, penalty notices for disorder and cautions⁵ ⁶.

Cannabis warnings [Table Q1.6]

For a first time offence of cannabis possession an adult is usually issued with a 'cannabis warning'.

There were 79,700 cannabis warnings issued in 2011. This was 3.3 per cent fewer than the 82,400 warnings issued in 2010.

Penalty Notices for Disorder issues [Tables Q2.1-Q2.2]

Penalty Notices for Disorder (PNDs) are more commonly known as 'on the spot fines'. PNDs are a fixed penalty of £50 or £80 designed to tackle low-level, anti-social and nuisance offending for offenders aged 16 or over and are issued for a range of minor offences.

There were 127,500 PNDs issued in 2011, a decrease of 9.4 per cent compared with 2010 and a fall of 38.6 per cent when compared with the peak of 207,500 PNDs issued in 2007.

Four offences accounted for 88.2 per cent of all PNDs issued in 2011, namely:

- 'Retail theft of goods under the value of £100' 27.2 per cent of all PNDs issued in 2011 (34,700);
- 'Drunk and disorderly' 28.2 per cent (36,000);
- 'Behaviour likely to cause harassment, alarm or distress' 20.1 per cent (25,600);
- 'Possession of cannabis' 12.8 per cent (16,300) of all PNDs issued.

There has been a year-on-year decrease in PNDs since their peak in 2007. This decreasing trend has been observed in all offence groups except possession of cannabis, which has increased year-on-year since coming into effect in 2009. However, the decrease in cannabis warnings over the same period suggests that the use of out of court disposals for those in possession of cannabis has remained constant, but with an increased usage of PNDs rather than cannabis warnings.

In 2011, 121,300 (95.1 per cent) of PNDs were issued to persons aged 18 and over (adults), with 6,200 (4.9 per cent) issued to persons aged 16 to 17. The proportion of PNDs issued to adults has increased year on year since 2007, due to larger decreases in issues of PNDs for the main offence categories listed above for persons aged 16 to 17 than for adults.




Figure 2.1: Penalty Notices for Disorder issued, 2005 to 2011

In 2011, 97,300 (76.3 per cent) of PNDs were issued to males and 30,300 (23.7 per cent) to females. The four most common offences committed by males were:

- 'Drunk and disorderly' 29,800 (30.7 per cent);
- 'Causing Harassment, alarm or distress' 22,000 (22.6 per cent);
- 'Theft (retail under £100)' 18,300 (18.8 per cent); and
- 'Possession of Cannabis' 15,400 (15.9 per cent).

The four most common offences committed by females were:

- 'Theft (retail under £100)' 16,400 (54.2 per cent);
- 'Drunk and disorderly' 6,200 (20.3 per cent);
- 'Causing Harassment, alarm or distress' 3,600 (11.8 per cent); and
- Wasting police time' 1,000 (3.5 per cent).

In 2011, 90,300 (70.8 per cent) PNDs were issued to white people, 2,500 (2.0 per cent) to black people, and 6,600 (5.2 per cent) to Asian people. The remaining 22,700 PNDs (17.8 per cent) had no recorded or unknown ethnicity. This split has remained fairly constant over the years for the high volume offences.

There were fewer PNDs issued in 32 of the 44 police force areas (including British Transport Police) in England and Wales compared with 2010. The largest absolute decrease was in the Merseyside Police Force area, where 8,390 PNDs were issued, a fall of 2,671 (24.1 per cent) since 2010. The largest proportionate decrease was in North Wales, where 27.0 per cent fewer PNDs were issued, a fall from 1,829 to 1,335. The police force area with the largest absolute increase was West Midlands, where 3,830 PNDs were issued, an increase of 762 (24.8 per cent) since 2010.

Penalty Notices for Disorder payments, court hearings and related fines [Supplementary table Q2c]

Once a PND has been issued the recipient has 21 days, the Suspended Enforcement Period (SEP), in which to either pay the penalty or request a court hearing. No admission of guilt is required and by paying the penalty the recipient discharges liability for conviction for the offence. Rather than paying the penalty, PND recipients can request a court hearing. If a recipient fails to pay a PND or elect a court hearing within the SEP, a fine of one and half times the penalty amount is registered by the court.

In 2011, 41.6 per cent of PNDs were paid within the SEP and a further 12.6 per cent were paid before a fine was registered. The payment rate for PNDs has fluctuated only slightly since their introduction in 2004, between the 51 and 55 per cent marks.

The payment rate for juveniles (aged 16 and 17) was 56.5 per cent in 2011 compared to 54.1 per cent for adults. The payment rate for juveniles has remained consistently higher than for adults since the start of the scheme.

Around one per cent of penalty notices have been contested at court in each year since PNDs were introduced. This figure is consistent among all age groups and offences.

In 2011, of the total number of PNDs issued, 36.8 per cent were registered as fines (37.1 per cent for adults and 32.0 per cent for juveniles). The number and proportion of PNDs for which a fine was registered has declined year-on-year since 2007, from 90,100 in 2007 (43.4 per cent of 2007 total issued) to 47,000 in 2011 (36.8 per cent of 2011 total issued).

Cautions [Tables Q2.3-Q2.5]

A caution can be given when there is sufficient evidence for a conviction and it is not considered to be in the public interest to institute criminal proceedings. Additionally, an offender must admit guilt and consent to a caution in order for one to be given. A formal caution may be given by, or on the instructions of, a senior police officer. Cautions have traditionally been mostly used for juvenile and first time offenders. A system of reprimands and final warnings replaced cautioning for juveniles in June 2000.

In 2011 there were 232,200 offenders cautioned, including juveniles given a reprimand or final warning. This represented a 4.4 per cent decrease from 242,800 in 2010, continuing a downward trend in the use of cautions since a peak of 362,900 in 2007. Compared with 2010, there were decreases in cautions issued for both indictable (a 7.2 per cent decrease) and summary offence types (a 0.9 per cent decrease).




Figure 2.2: Offenders cautioned by offence type, 2001 to 2011

Fewer cautions were administered in all offence groups in 2011 compared with 2010, except for *drug offences* which increased from 40,700 to 42,700, *robbery* which increased from 207 to 269 and *sexual offences* which increased from 1,364 to 1,532. The largest decrease compared with 2010 was in cautions issued for the indictable offence *violence against the person*, which decreased by 26.4 per cent.

Four in every five cautions issued for indictable offences are for *violence against the person*, *theft and handling* or *drug offences*. Of the 123,900 cautions issued for indictable offences in 2011, 35.1 per cent were for *theft and handling*, 34.5 per cent for *drug offences* and 13.0 per cent for *violence against the person*.

Cautioning ratio

In 2011, the *cautioning ratio* – the proportion of offenders who are either cautioned or convicted that are given a caution – was 21.9 per cent, which has declined from a peak of 31.1 per cent in 2007. This coincided with the replacement in April 2008 of a target to increase offences brought to justice with one placing more of an emphasis on targeting serious crime.

The cautioning ratio varies across offence group and is typically higher for indictable offences than summary offences.

Within indictable offences in 2011, the cautioning ratio was highest for *drug offences* (41.3 per cent) and *criminal damage* (40.1 per cent), and was lowest for *robbery* (2.8 per cent).

The cautioning ratio for *violence against the person* offences in 2011 (27.6 per cent) is the lowest it has been in the series back to 2001, and has decreased year-on-year since a peak of 57.8 per cent in 2006.

Court proceedings

If there is sufficient evidence against the defendant and none of the out of court disposals are appropriate, the police will formally charge the suspect. The law then requires the defendant to be brought before a magistrates' court as soon as possible. The defendant can be summoned to appear in court or remanded on bail or custody.

Magistrates' courts [Table Q3.5]

Virtually all criminal court cases start in a magistrates' court and less serious offences can be handled entirely within this court.

There were 1.56 million defendants proceeded against at magistrates' courts in 2011, a decrease of 5.7 per cent from the 1.65 million proceedings in 2010.

The total proceedings figure can be split into two offence groups – summary proceedings, which cover the less serious offences such as TV license evasion and common assault, and indictable proceedings (including triable-either-way offences), which cover the more serious offences. Proceedings for both offence groups decreased in 2011 – a drop of 5.8 per cent from 2010 for summary offences (from 1.22 million to 1.14 million) and a drop of 5.5 per cent from 2010 for indictable offences (from 438,000 to 414,000).

Summary proceedings can be dealt with entirely within the magistrates' courts and make up around three quarters of all proceedings. Of the 1.14 million summary proceedings in 2011, just under half (546,600, or 47.7 per cent) of these proceedings related to summary motoring proceedings, which include offences such as speeding, driving while disqualified and drunk driving. This year is the first time over the last 11 years that summary non-motoring offences account for more than half of all summary offences (598,400 in 2011, or 52.3 per cent).

The 5.8 per cent drop in proceedings for summary offences between 2010 and 2011 is not split evenly between summary motoring and summary non-motoring proceedings:

- Defendants proceeded against for summary motoring offences fell by 10.1 per cent from 608,100 during 2010 to 546,600 during 2011.
- Defendants proceeded against for summary non-motoring offences fell by 1.4 per cent from 607,100 during 2010 to 598,400 during 2011.

Over the past decade, defendants proceeded against peaked at 2.02 million in 2004. Compared to this peak, there were 22.9 per cent fewer defendants proceeded against in 2011. This was made up of an 8.7 per cent decrease in those proceeded against for indictable offences, a 10.1 per cent decrease in those proceeded against for summary non-motoring offences and a 39.5 per cent decrease in those proceeded against for summary motoring offences.




Figure 3.1 Defendants proceeded against at magistrates' courts by type of offence, 2001 to 2011

Remands

Police remands are the decisions made by a police officer on whether to detain or bail a defendant pending their first appearance in court or send a notice summoning them to appear in court. Court remands are the court's decision on whether a defendant charged with a criminal offence should be held in custody or released on bail during the period up to and including the trial, or while awaiting sentence.

Defendants are more likely to be remanded in custody for indictable offences than summary offences. As a result the proportion of defendants remanded in custody at the Crown Court is higher than at magistrates' courts.

Police remands [Table 3.1]

In 2011, there were 1.64 million defendants directed to appear at magistrates' courts⁷, a decrease of 5.7 per cent compared with the 2010 total (1.73 million). Of these, 32.4 per cent were granted bail by the police, 11.4 per cent were remanded in custody, with the remaining 56.3 per cent directed to appear via summonses.

The proportion of defendants remanded in custody has increased every year since 2007, driven mainly by the rise in defendants remanded in custody for indictable offences. The proportion remanded in custody varies by offence type:

- 28.4 per cent (130,000) for indictable offences in 2011, 0.3 percentage points higher than in 2010 and 12.4 percentage points higher than in 2007;
- 7.5 per cent (46,000) for summary non-motoring offences in 2011, 0.2 percentage points lower than in 2010; and;

• 2.0 per cent (11,000) for summary motoring offences, 0.6 percentage points higher than in 2010.

Magistrates' courts [Table 3.2]

In 2011, 1.64 million defendants were proceeded against at magistrates' courts⁸. Of these it was estimated⁹ that:

- Bail was granted to 33.0 per cent, 0.9 percentage points lower than in 2010.
 This decrease in proportion granted bail represented a reversal of the upward trend since 2003, when bail was granted to 23.5 per cent of defendants;
- 3.4 per cent were remanded in custody, 0.1 per cent lower than in 2010; and
- the remaining 63.7 per cent had their case concluded at the magistrates' courts without being remanded, 1.0 percentage points higher than in 2010.

The proportion of defendants remanded into custody at magistrates' courts has remained broadly consistent since 2001.

The proportion of defendants remanded in custody by magistrates' courts by offence type in 2011 was:

- For indictable cases 10.0 per cent (45,600);
- For summary non-motoring offences 1.3 per cent (8,300);
- For summary motoring offences 0.2 per cent (992).

Outcomes of cases dealt with by magistrates' courts [Table Q3a]

Of the 1.04 million defendants not remanded by magistrates in 2011:

- A custodial sentence was given to 2.4 per cent (24,600), the same proportion as in 2010;
- 2.7 per cent (27,800) were committed to the Crown Court for sentence or trial;
- Those acquitted or not proceeded against accounted for 14.8 per cent (153,700);
- A further 77.5 per cent (806,500) were given a non-custodial sentence.

Of the 539,100 defendants remanded on bail:

- A custodial sentence was given to 2.6 per cent (13,800);
- 11.4 per cent (61,600) were committed to the Crown Court for sentence or trial;



- 15.2 per cent (82,000) were acquitted or not proceeded against, a decrease of 1.6 percentage points on 2010;
- a further 62.3 per cent (335,700) were given a non-custodial sentence, a decrease of 5.7 percentage points on 2010.

Of the 54,900 defendants remanded in custody:

- A custodial sentence was given to 14.0 per cent (7,700) given, a decrease of 1.0 percentage points on 2010;
- 55.2 per cent (30,400) were committed to the Crown Court for sentence or trial;
- Those acquitted or not proceeded against accounted for 11.8 per cent (6,500);
- a further 16.1 per cent (8,900) were given a non-custodial sentence.

Committals [Table A3.5]

More serious (indictable) offences are sent by magistrates' courts to the Crown Court for either trial or sentence.

- 97,600 defendants were committed for trial at the Crown Court in 2011. This represented a decrease of 8.3 per cent from 2010 (106,400), and reversed the upward trend seen since 2006 (79,500).
- Over the same period the proportion of cases committed for trial where the defendant was remanded in custody has remained broadly consistent between 30.2 to 32.6 per cent;

The highest proportions of defendants committed for trial and remanded in custody in 2011 were for the offences of burglary (54.1 per cent), robbery (51.0 per cent) and criminal damage (47.1 per cent). These proportions are almost unchanged compared with 2010 with the exception of criminal damage which increased by 8.2 percentage points to 47.1 per cent in 2011.

Crown court remands [Table Q3.3]

In 2011, the proportion of defendants tried at the Crown Court who were remanded on bail was 50.4 per cent. This represented a decrease of 3.2 percentage points from 2010 (53.6 per cent), and reversed the upward trend seen since 2006 (47.3 per cent). By contrast, between 2010 and 2011, the proportion of defendants remanded in custody increased from 33.6 per cent to 34.7 per cent.

Outcomes of cases dealt with at the Crown Court [Table Q3a]

Of the 43,600 defendants remanded in custody by the Crown Court in 2011:

- A custodial sentence was given to 73.0 per cent (31,900);
- Those acquitted or not proceeded against accounted for 11.5 per cent (5,000).

Of the 63,400 defendants remanded on bail by the Crown Court in 2011:

- A custodial sentence was given to 23.8 per cent (15,100);
- Those acquitted or not proceeded against accounted for 24.3 per cent (15,400)

Ethnicity [Table A3.10b]

Data on the ethnic appearance of offenders is currently only collated for indictable offences. This is because a defendant is not required to attend court for a number of summary offences (e.g. TV license evasion) hence an observation regarding ethnicity can therefore not be made.

During 2011, the proportion of white defendants tried at the Crown Court for indictable offences who were remanded in custody was 34.9 per cent. This figure was 45.0 per cent for black defendants and 33.5 per cent for Asian defendants.

These differences are likely to be a reflection of the different offences tried and different defendant characteristics between ethnicities. For more information see the publication 'Race and the Criminal Justice System' 10.

Failure to appear [Table Q3a]

Each year a proportion of defendants fail to appear in court having been summonsed to appear or granted bail.

In 2011, approximately 76,100 defendants failed to appear to bail or summons at magistrates' courts; 4.7 per cent of those directed to appear. This proportion has remained relatively stable since 2009, at between 5.1 and 4.7 per cent.

In 2011, approximately 3,100 defendants failed to appear to bail at the Crown Court, compared with 2,600 in 2010, an increase of 19.2 per cent. This follows on from a decrease between 2009 and 2010 of 10.3 per cent in the number of defendants who failed to appear.

Offenders found guilty

A conviction is where a person or a company is found guilty of a criminal offence at either the magistrates' courts or the Crown Court.

Trends in convictions [Table Q4.1]

There were 1.56 million proceedings in 2011 compares with 1.65 million in 2010, a decrease of 5.7 per cent. There were 4.9 per cent fewer offenders convicted and sentenced, the 1.30 million in 2011 comparing with 1.37 million in 2010.

In 2011, there were:

- 414,000 prosecutions and 338,600 convictions for indictable offences a decrease of 5.5 and 3.4 per cent respectively since 2010. Looking over the decade, prosecutions for indictable offences peaked at 517,100 in 2002 and have fallen by 19.9 per cent since, while convictions have fluctuated over the entire decade between 303,000 and 351,000.
- 598,400 prosecutions and 488,400 convictions for summary non-motoring offences a decrease of 1.4 per cent and 1.0 per cent respectively since 2010, continuing the decrease in both prosecutions and convictions since 2004.
- 546,600 prosecutions and 473,400 convictions for summary motoring offences a decrease of 10.1 per cent and 9.6 per cent respectively since 2010 and a continuation of the large falls in both prosecutions and convictions for summary motoring offences since 2004.

The public disorder of August 2011 is included in these figures. Those convicted for the public disorder by the end of December 2011 account for less than one per cent of all people convicted in 2011.

Convictions for indictable offences accounted for 26.0 per cent of the total offenders found guilty in 2011. This represents the highest proportion in the last eleven years and continues the trend of year on year rises since 2004, when the percentage was 20.5 per cent. In 2011, summary non-motoring offences accounted for 37.6 per cent, and summary motoring offences for 36.4 per cent of convictions respectively.

Convictions by offence group [Tables Q4.1 and Q4.3]

Three of the ten indictable offence groups show an increased number of convictions in 2011 compared to 2010. These include changes in the following offence groups:

- Convictions for Sexual offences increased by 3.3 per cent from 5,800 to 6,000. This is a continuation of a general upward trend, and is the highest number of persons convicted for sexual offences in the last 11 years. This is reflected in the conviction ratio (the proportion of defendants proceeded against who were found guilty) of 60.3 per cent for sexual offences, which has increased by 5.5 percentage points since 2010 and is the highest for 3 years.
- Robbery offences increased by 9.0 per cent from 8,500 to 9,300, and the conviction ratio increased by 3.0 percentage points to 65.0 per cent.


• Burglary convictions increased by 5.0 per cent from 24,000 to 25,100, and the conviction ratio increased by 1.1 percentage point to 76.3 per cent.

Convictions peaked in 2004 and have fallen by 16.0 per cent since. These falls have largely been driven by declines in convictions for summary motoring and summary non-motoring offences since 2004.

Conviction demographics [Table Q4.2]

A total of 949,100 males were found guilty in 2011, accounting for 76.1 per cent of all persons ¹¹ convicted. This compares with 298,100 females found guilty, 23.9 per cent of all persons. The proportion of convictions accounted for by males has decreased 6.2 percentage points from 82.3 per cent in 2001. This trend has been driven by a decrease in males found guilty of summary motoring offences and an increase in females found guilty of summary non-motoring offences (including TV license evasion and common assault) over the period.

A total of 62,000 juveniles (males and females aged 10 to 17) were found guilty during 2011 (5.0 per cent of all persons found guilty).

In 2011 there were 338,600 offenders found guilty of an indictable offence, of which 90.2 per cent were of a known ethnicity. This represents a 31.6 percentage point increase in known ethnicity since 2008, the year in which the LIBRA case management system was rolled out in magistrates' courts.

Around three-quarters of the total persons found guilty of an indictable offence at all courts were white. Within offence types, this ranged from 45.4 per cent for *Fraud and forgery* to 85.3 per cent for *Criminal damage*.

For all indictable offences, 9.4 per cent of offenders were black, again varying by offence type – ranging from 4.3 per cent for *Criminal damage* to 25.7 per cent for *Robbery*.

Asian offenders made up 4.8 per cent of all offenders convicted for all indictable offences.

Conviction ratio [Table Q4.3]

The conviction ratio is defined as the proportion of defendants proceeded against who were found guilty. In 2011, the conviction ratio for all offences was 83.4 per cent, an increase of 0.7 percentage points compared to 2010. The overall conviction ratio has risen by 10.0 percentage points since 2001.

Comparing 2011 with 2010, there was:

- an increase of 1.7 percentage points in the conviction ratio for indictable offences (81.8 per cent in 2011).
- an increase of 0.3 percentage points in the conviction ratio for summary nonmotoring offences (81.6 per cent in 2011).
- an increase of 0.5 percentage points in the conviction ratio for summary motoring offences (86.6 per cent in 2011).

In 2011, the conviction ratio increased for eight of the ten indictable offence groups compared to 2010. Comparing with 2001, conviction rates have risen for all indictable offence groups. The largest increase has been for *Violence against the*

person, which has increased by 24.9 percentage points from a conviction rate of 46.0 per cent to 70.9 per cent across the 11 year period.

Figure 4.3: Conviction ratio by indictable offence group, 2001 to 2011



Sentencing

When someone is convicted of a crime, they will be given a sentence by a court which reflects the seriousness of the offence or offences committed by the offender. Sentences are generally time spent in prison, a community sentence, a fine or discharge.

In 2011 there were 1.30 million ¹² offenders sentenced following a criminal conviction, a decrease of 4.8 per cent from 1.37 million offenders in 2010. The public disorder of August 2011 had little impact on these figures as those convicted for the public disorder accounted for less than one per cent of offenders in 2011. Compared to 2010 there was:

- a decrease of 5.4 per cent in offenders sentenced for summary offences (962,100 compared to 1,017,100 in 2010) and a decrease of 3.2 per cent for offenders sentenced for indictable offences (337,100 compared to 348,200 in 2010).
- a decrease of 5.2 per cent in offenders sentenced at magistrates' courts (1,197,100 compared to 1,263,400 in 2010) and an increase of 0.2 per cent in offenders sentenced at the Crown Court (102,200 compared to 102,000 in 2010).

The total number of Crown Court sentences reported in this publication differs from the total reported in the Sentencing Council's publication: Crown Court Sentencing Survey (CCSS), 2011. The CCSS release presents a national total of 95,032 sentences for principal offences across England and Wales at the Crown Court in 2011. The reasons for the difference are as follows:

- A provisional version of the Ministry of Justice database of all Crown Court sentences was used to conduct the matching and subsequent analysis of the Crown Court Sentencing Survey data. This was necessary to allow a timely release of the CCSS data; and
- Whilst completing the CCSS matching exercise, a number of records were found in the Ministry of Justice database which warranted further inspection.
 For consistency with previous years, these records have been included in this edition of the Criminal Justice System statistical release, whereas they have been excluded from the CCSS publication. Once investigations have been completed, any necessary revisions will be made.

Sentence outcomes for all offences

In the long term, there has been an increase in the number of Suspended Sentence Orders (SSO) reflecting the change in legislation when it was introduced on 4 April 2005. Although the SSO should only be used where the court is minded to pass a custodial sentence of less than 12 months, the increase in offenders sentenced with a SSO has not been offset by a similar decrease in offenders sentenced with a custodial sentence of less than 12 months.




Figure 6.1: Sentence outcomes handed down by courts, 2011

<u>Custodial sentences</u>

In 2011, there were 102,700 persons sentenced to immediate custody, an increase of 1.2 per cent from 101,500 persons in 2010 but 8.0 per cent lower than the peak of 111,600 persons sentenced in 2002. Of these 46,000, custodial sentences were imposed at magistrates' courts and 56,700 were imposed at Crown Courts, a decrease of 5.9 per cent and an increase of 7.7 percent respectively compared to 2010.

The immediate custody rate declined from 7.9 per cent in 2002 to a low of 6.8 per cent in 2006 and 2007, and has since increased back to 7.9 per cent in 2011.

There were 1,214 indeterminate sentences (either a life sentence or an Indeterminate sentence for Public Protection – an IPP) handed down in 2011, a 13.5 per cent decrease from 1,403 in 2010. This continued the fall since the Criminal Justice and Immigration Act (CJIA) 2008 was introduced, which restricted the use of IPPs. Within this group, the number of life sentences increased from 384 in 2010 to 395 in 2011, the first annual increase since 2008.

In 2011, the Average Custodial Sentence Length (ACSL) was 14.7 months, an increase of 1.0 months compared to 2010, and up from 11.8 months in 2001. The rise in ACSL has been driven by the change in the case mix of people getting custodial sentences and longer sentences for indictable offences.

 In 2001, summary motoring offences accounted for 15.9 per cent of immediate custodial sentences, with an ACSL of 3.4 months. By 2011, they accounted for just 3.1 per cent of immediate custodial sentences, with a reduction in ACSL to 3.1 months.

- In 2001, indictable offences accounted for 75.5 per cent of immediate custodial sentences, with an ACSL of 14.7 months. By 2011 they accounted for 83.0 per cent of immediate custodial sentences, with an increase in ACSL to 17.2 months. In particular, sexual offences saw a rise in ACSL from 40.0 months in 2004 to 53.2 months in 2011, following the implementation of the Sexual Offences Act 2003.
- The decrease in indeterminate sentences mentioned above coincides with an increase in long determinate sentences (10 years or more) from 514 in 2010 to 671 in 2011, a 30.5 per cent increase, and the highest number in the last 11 years. This may also have contributed to the increase in average custodial sentence length since 2008.

At the magistrates' courts, the ACSL increased by 0.03 months from 2010 to 2.6 months, whilst at the Crown Court the ASCL increased by 0.4 months from 2010 to 24.7 months.

Suspended Sentence Orders

In 2011 there were 47,800 Suspended Sentence Orders handed down, a decrease of 0.7 per cent from 2010. Of these sentences:

- 26,200 persons received their sentence at the magistrates' courts, the same as in 2010. This type of sentence was given to 2.2 per cent of persons in a magistrate's court in 2011, an increase from 1.7 per cent of persons in 2006.
- 21,600 suspended sentences were given at the Crown Court, a decrease of 1.6 per cent compared to 2010. Just over one fifth (21.1 per cent) of persons were given a suspended sentence at the Crown Court, an increase from 13.4 per cent in 2006. Between 2001 and 2005 only 2.0 to 3.4 per cent of persons were given a suspended sentence at the Crown Court.

Community sentences

There were 173,400 community sentences handed down in 2011, a decrease of 8.4 per cent from 2010. For adults, Community Orders accounted for nearly all the community sentences given to adults (99.5 per cent) while for juveniles the Referral Order was still the most common sentence (accounting for 52.1 per cent of all juvenile community sentences). The Youth Rehabilitation Order (YRO) introduced in 2010 accounted for a further 44.1 per cent of all juvenile community sentences in 2011. Of the 173,400 community sentences handed down:

- 156,300 persons received their sentence at magistrates' courts; this was an 8.1 per cent fall from 2010 (down 13,700 sentences). Over the past ten years, the magistrates' court community sentence rate (the proportion of all persons sentenced at the magistrates' court receiving a community sentence) has ranged between 11.4 per cent in 2001 and 13.7 per cent in 2008 and 2009.
- 17,100 persons received their sentence at the Crown Court. This was an 11.2 per cent decrease from 2010 (down by 2,100 sentences). The Crown Court community sentence rate decreased by 2.1 per cent from 2010 to 16.7 per cent.

Fines

Fines continue to be the most common sentence due to the large volumes issued at magistrate's courts. In 2011 there were 851,600 fines handed down (99.8 per cent of these being issued at magistrates' courts). Of the offenders receiving fines in 2011:

- The majority were issued for summary offences, with only 6.8 per cent issued for indictable offences.
- The fine rate for indictable offences at all courts was 17.2 per cent, a similar proportion to 2009 and 2010. This has decreased from 24.0 per cent in 2001.
- The median fine for all offences was £175, the same as 2010 and 2009. The mean fine decreased to £215 compared with £223 in 2010. [Annual supplementary tables: A5.44a, A5.44b].

Other sentences [Annual supplementary table A5.4]

Other sentences comprise absolute and conditional discharges and 'otherwise dealt with' sentences. The latter category deals with a miscellaneous group containing: mental health disposals; ancillary orders; and other procedural disposals. There were 123,700 other sentences handed down in 2011. These comprised:

- 85,000 conditional discharges; a decrease of 6.1 per cent from 2010 and a fall of 16.1 per cent from 2001.
- 8,100 absolute discharges; a decrease of 8.8 per cent from 2010 and a fall of 46.9 per cent from 2001.
- 30,700 offenders 'otherwise dealt with', a decrease of 7.3 per cent from 2010 but an increase of 10.0 per cent from 2001.

Sentence outcomes by age band

In 2011 there were 1.23 million adults (aged 18 and over) sentenced, a decrease of 4.2 per cent from 2010 and 14.6 per cent from 2004 when the highest number of adults were sentenced over the ten year period (1.44 million).

The proportion of adult offenders receiving fines decreased 4.0 percentage points over the last decade, from 72.3 per cent in 2001 to 68.3 per cent in 2011.

In 2011 there were 62,500 juveniles (aged 10-17) sentenced, a decrease of 15.4 per cent from 2010 and 34.5 per cent from 2001. The number of juveniles sentenced remained relatively constant between 2001 and 2007 but the number and proportion of community sentences increased; from 42,859 in 2001 to 66,007 in 2007 (up 54.0 per cent). While the number of juveniles sentenced has decreased since 2007, the community sentence rate for juveniles has remained between 64.6 and 68.6 per cent.

The large increase in the community sentence rate for juveniles over the last decade has been offset by decreases in the fine rate (from 23.1 per cent in 2001 to 8.2 per cent in 2011) and the discharge rate (from 18.3 per cent in 2001 to 13.8 per cent in 2011).

Figure 6.2 provides a breakdown of all the sentence outcomes for juveniles and adults, showing how offences committed by juveniles and adults are dealt with differently by the courts.

Offenders sentenced by ethnicity

Data on the ethnicity of offenders is currently held for offenders who have been convicted of an indictable offence. In 2011 there were 336,300 persons sentenced for indictable offences of which 90.4 per cent were of a known ethnicity. Of these persons:

- 74.6 per cent were White; 9.4 per cent were Black; and 4.8 per cent were Asian. The remaining 1.7 per cent were of 'other' ethnicity.
- The immediate custody rate for indictable offences for all ethnicities was 25.3 per cent. This varied between ethnicities with: White offenders having a custody rate of 24.6 per cent; Black offenders having a custody rate of 28.2 per cent; Asian offenders having a custody rate of 30.6 per cent; and 'other' having a custody rate of 42.8 per cent.

These differences are likely to relate to a range of factors including variations in the offences committed and the plea entered by people from different ethnic backgrounds. For more information see the publication 'Race and the Criminal Justice System' 13.

Sentence outcomes and offence types by gender

In 2011, there were 948,400 sentences given to males and 298,000 to females. This represents a decrease for both males and females since 2010 (6.4 per cent and 2.3 per cent decreases respectively). While for males this represents a continuing decrease since 2004, for females this is a rare decrease in what has otherwise been an upward trend since 2001 (up by 25.4 per cent since 2001).

Sentencing outcomes are different for males and females. For example, immediate custody accounted for 9.9 percent of sentence outcomes in males and 2.7 per cent in females in 2011. A higher proportion of community sentences were also given to males – 15.1 per cent compared to 9.6 per cent to females in 2011. Conversely, a higher proportion of females receive fines, 76.6 per cent compared to 60.6 per cent of males in 2011.

The difference between males and females in the type of sentence outcomes is likely to reflect the types of offences being committed. For example, in 2011, 19.4 per cent of males were sentenced for drug related offence, compared to 9.3 per cent of females. Conversely, 52.1 per cent of females committed an offence relating to theft and handling stolen goods, compared to 33.0 per cent of males.

Offences [Tables 6.1 - 6.4]

This chapter differs from the others in the publication by counting on an all offence basis, as opposed to a principal offence basis.

Courts and the police typically deal with defendants charged with more than one offence; for example, in 2011 each defendant was charged with an average of 1.4 offences.

This average rate of offences per offender has decreased slightly year on year since 2003, when it stood at an average of 1.7.

In comparison with 2001, the number of convicted offences fell by 18.4 per cent to 1.81 million in 2011. However, over the same period, the total number of convicted offenders fell by 3.7 per cent to 1.30 million in 2011.

Convictions (all offence basis)

In 2011, there were 1.81 million convicted offences, a decrease of 5.9 per cent from 1.92 million in 2010. Since a peak over the last decade of 2.55 million in 2004, there have been year on year decreases in total convicted offences, with an overall fall of 29.1 per cent when comparing the 2011 total with 2004. The decrease has been driven in the main by convictions for summary motoring offences, which have fallen by 52.2 per cent between 2004 and 2011 (from 1.33 million to 636,300).

Indictable offences accounted for 31.5 per cent of convicted offences in 2011. This represented a slight increase on 2010 and a continuation of an increasing trend observed since 2004 due to the decrease in summary motoring convictions.

Summary motoring offences accounted for 35.2 per cent of all offences in 2011, a series low over the last decade. In the series peak of 2004, summary motoring offences accounted for 52.3 per cent of all offences, with the proportion having fallen year on year since.

Cautions (all offence basis)

In 2011, there were 260,400 cautions issued for all offences, an increase of 1.7 per cent from 264,700 in 2010. This decrease continues the downward trend observed since the peak of 397,000 offences cautioned in 2007.

There were 138,000 cautions for indictable offences in 2011, a 5.1 per cent decrease since 2010, continuing the decreasing trend since the peak over the last decade of 222,200 cautions for indictable offence in 2007. The remaining 122,400 cautions in 2011 were for summary non-motoring offences, a 2.5 per cent increase since 2010, and the reversal of a decreasing trend since the peak of 174,700 in 2007.

Indictable offences accounted for 53.0 per cent of cautions (138,000) in 2011. This proportion has been broadly declining since a peak of 63.7 per cent in 2002, due to the more rapid rate of decline of cautions for summary non-motoring offences.

Offences Brought to Justice (notifiable offences)

One measure of justice outcomes is Offences Brought to Justice (OBTJ). An offence is said to have been brought to justice when a 'notifiable offence' results in an offender being convicted, cautioned, issued with a Penalty Notice for Disorder (PND) or a cannabis warning, or having an offence taken into consideration at court.

In 2011, there were 1.21 million OBTJs, a decrease of 4.3 per cent from 1.26 million in 2010. Recorded crime totals fell by 1.4 per cent over the same period.

Offences brought to justice increased from 1.00 million in 2001 to a series high of 1.46 million in 2007. The total has been steadily falling since 2007 with an average decrease of 4.5 per cent each year. Cautions and convictions account for the vast majority of all OBTJs.

Convictions accounted for 60.7 per cent of all OBTJs in 2011, the same proportion as in 2010. The proportion declined from a peak of 68.6 per cent in 2002 to 49.4 per cent in 2006, followed by a year on year increase to 2010. This trend is driven by the patterns in the use of out of court disposals.

Cautions accounted for 20.2 per cent of OBTJs in 2011, a 6.2 per cent decrease since 2006. PNDs made up 6.8 per cent of OBTJs, continuing a downward trend observed since 2006 when they accounted for 10.1 per cent of OBTJs. Formal warnings for cannabis possession accounted for 6.6 per cent of OBTJs (79,700).

Offences taken into consideration accounted for the remaining 5.8 per cent of OBTJs, the lowest reported proportional total in the series – compared to a peak of 9.6 per cent seen in 2002.

In 2011, the main offence groups which make up OBTJs were *violence against the person* (28.1 per cent), *theft and handling stolen goods* (25.3 per cent) and *drug offences* (19.6 per cent).

The proportion of all OBTJs accounted for by *violence against the person* has increased by 10.3 percentage points since 2001. Similarly, *drug offences* have increased in proportion by 9.9 percentage points since 2001. However, over the same period, *theft and handling stolen goods* decreased in proportion by 3.8 percentage points.

Offending histories

below

Information presented in this section differs from previous sections on convictions, cautions and sentencing, in that all information in this chapter is taken from the Police National Computer (PNC). The main difference is that the PNC does not include a range of less serious summary offences (such as TV licence evasion and a range of motoring offences) and so the figures reported are not comparable or match figures reported in the previous chapters.

This section provides information on the breakdown of offences committed by new and repeat offenders, the trends in new entrants to the criminal justice system, and breakdowns of the criminal histories of cautioned and sentenced offenders.

First offences and further offences [Tables Q7.1, Q7a and Q7b]

An offence is defined as a first offence if it results in the offender receiving their first reprimand, warning, caution or conviction – i.e. they have no previous criminal history recorded on the PNC. Offences resulting in further reprimands, warnings, cautions or convictions are known as further offences since the offender already has a recorded criminal history.

In 2011, a total of 841,000¹⁵ first offences and further offences were recorded, a decrease of 4.7 per cent compared with 882,900 recorded in 2010. This continues the year on year decrease observed since 2007. Of these recorded offences in 2011:

- 24.8 per cent of offences were committed by offenders with no previous criminal offences, a decrease from 26.3 per cent in 2010. The proportion of offences were committed by offenders with no previous criminal offences has decreased by almost 10 percentage points since 2006.
- 18.5 per cent of first offences are committed by juveniles, compared to 10.6 per cent of further offences;
- Juveniles received 19.2 per cent of cautions, reprimands and warnings compared to 10.1 per cent of convictions.

Figure 7.1 shows the breakdown of all offences recorded in 2011. The percentages in the diagram relate to the total number of offences committed in the top box of the figure.





Figure 7.2: Number of juvenile first and further offences in England and Wales, 2001 to 2011






Figure 7.3: Number of adult first and further offences in England and Wales, 2001 to 2011

Figures 7.2 and 7.3 illustrate trends over time in first and further offending. Figure 7.2 shows the peak for juvenile first time entrants in 2006 and the subsequent large falls in offending, which coincided with the removal of a target in April 2008 to increase offences brought to justice and a move towards bringing more serious crimes to justice. Figure 7.3 shows a different pattern for adults, with first time entrants decreasing after a peak in 2007, but further offending continuing to rise.

Figure 7.1: First offences and further offences in 2011

First time entrants to Criminal Justice system

First time entrants to the criminal justice are classified as offenders, resident in England and Wales, who received their first reprimand, warning, caution or conviction, based on data recorded by the police on the PNC.

In 2011, there were 208,300 first time entrants to the criminal justice system. This represents a 10.2 per cent decrease on 2010 (231,900) and continues the year on year decline observed since 2006 – the 2011 figure representing a 36.8 per cent decrease compared to 2006 levels. This is driven by the decline since 2006 in the use of cautions ¹⁶ in dealing with first time entrants.

The number of juvenile first time entrants to the criminal justice system has fallen much more sharply than for adult offenders in recent years – down 21.2 per cent in 2011 from 2010 levels (a 64.7 per cent decrease since 2006), compared to a 7.2 per cent decrease for adults from 2010 levels (a 23.0 per cent decrease since 2006).

The differing trends in adult and juvenile first time entrants are largely due to the different disposals received. The majority of juvenile first time entrants receive a reprimand or final warning – 80.9 per cent in 2011 – while roughly half of adult first time entrants receive a caution – 51.2 per cent in 2011.

As mentioned previously, the decline in the use of cautions coincided with changes to a Government target. Increased funding was also made available to Youth Offending Teams for preventative and diversionary work with young people, which may also have had an impact (further work would have to be undertaken to assess the extent of any impact).

The rate of juvenile first time entrants per 100,000 of population has fallen from 933 to 747 over the last 12 months. This is roughly twice the equivalent rate for adult first time entrants, which has also fallen over the last 12 months, from 424 per 100,000 to 389.

Criminal histories

An offender is counted as having a criminal history if their PNC record shows that, at the time of receiving a reprimand, warning, caution or conviction, they had previously committed one or more offences that had resulted in one of these sanctions. The PNC data excludes a range of summary offences, and therefore unlike the other sections of offending histories, the criminal histories section focuses on the criminal histories of offenders cautioned or sentenced for indictable offences only.

Offenders cautioned¹⁷ for indictable offences on the PNC [Table Q7.4 and Q7k]

In 2011, a total of 124,200 offenders received reprimands, warnings or cautions for indictable offences, a decrease of 9.9 per cent compared with 2010 and continuing a year on year decline since 2006. Of those in 2011:

- 51.0 per cent had no previous convictions, reprimands or warnings recorded, a decrease of 2.9 percentage points from 2010.
- 3.7 per cent had 15 or more previous convictions, reprimands or warnings, an increase of around 0.6 percentage points compared with 2010. This proportion has grown each year from the 1.3 per cent observed in 2001.

Offenders sentenced for indictable offences on the PNC [Table Q7.5, A7.1 to A7.13]

In 2011, a total of 327,900 offenders were sentenced for indictable offences, a slight decrease (1.3 per cent) compared with 2010. Of those in 2011:

- 10.1 per cent had no previous convictions or cautions recorded against them, a fall of 0.4 percentage points compared with 2010, and 1.8 percentage points lower than in 2001;
- 31.2 per cent of all offenders sentenced for indictable offences had 15 or more previous convictions or cautions recorded against them, an increase of 2.3 percentage points from 2010 and 13.3 percentage points from 2001.

Previous custodial sentences

68.5 per cent of offenders who received an immediate custodial sentence for an indictable offence in 2011 had had a previous custodial sentence. The proportion of those given a community sentence having had a previous community sentence was 63.8 per cent.

Criminal history by sentence type

The criminal history of offenders receiving different sentences varies by sentence, with custodial sentences associated with higher levels of previous offences. In 2011:

- 45.5 per cent of adult offenders receiving custodial sentences for indictable offences had 15 or more previous convictions/cautions.
- 29.0 per cent of adult offenders receiving a fine had 15 or more previous convictions/cautions

However, caution should be taken in interpreting these figures on recent disposal and the number of previous convictions and cautions. There are many factors which influence the sentence given including the severity of the offence and whether a guilty plea is given. Full details of factors influencing sentencing are given in the Crown Court Sentencing Survey, 2011¹⁸.

Criminal history by offence type

The criminal history of an offender varies with the type of offence. In 2011:

- 6.0 per cent of offenders convicted of burglary, 5.8 per cent of offenders convicted of theft and handling stolen goods and 6.7 per cent of offenders convicted of drug offences were first time offenders
- This compares with 39.1 per cent of those convicted of *sexual offences*, 32.0 per cent of those convicted of *fraud and forgery* and 23.0 per cent of those convicted of *indictable motoring offences*.
- 35.7 per cent of offenders sentenced for *burglary* had three or more previous convictions or cautions for *burglary*.
- 64.6 per cent of offenders who were sentenced for *shoplifting* had three or more previous convictions or cautions for *shoplifting*.
